



**Mission Inn Resort & Club**  
**Las Colinas Golf Course**  
*Hole by Hole Description*

**Hole 1 “Lakeside”                    396 Yards, par 4**

The course opens with a gentle par 4 offering great views of the resort. A wide fairway and fairly flat green can mean opening the round with a good score. But beware: A drive hit too far left will find the fairway bunker; too far right will end up in the lake.

**Hole 2 “Howey’s Redan”    206 Yards, par 3**

This par 3 requires a medium to long iron approach to a long but shallow green. A lake threatens the shot hit too short, while one too long could finish in the back bunkers having to hit back toward the water. The smart miss is left of the green, leaving the best chance for an up-and-down par.

**Hole 3 “Far and Away”        445 Yards, par 4**

A long par 4 with a slight dogleg right requires a big drive down the left side to leave a good view to the green. However, too far left means flirting with a fairway bunker or out of bounds. The green slopes strongly back to front.

**Hole 4 “Sand Dunes”            432 Yards, par 4**

This dogleg left features bunkers down the left side of the fairway, hills and woods down the right. The green has subtle undulations. Miss short rather than long on the approach.

**Hole 5 “Reward”                500 Yards, par 5**

The fairway doglegs right with bunkers protecting the left side, heavy forest guarding the right. Long hitters can try going for the green in two, but a pond in front will drown shots that fall short. The green has three tiers, and landing on the wrong one usually guarantees a three-putt or worse.

**Hole 6 “Little Hills”            194 Yards, par 3**

A slightly uphill par 3 to a green that slopes back to front. Be sure to hit the green—shots that land short can run back toward the lake—and stay left, away from the small hills on the right side.

**Hole 7 “Free Fall”                398 Yards, par 4**

The slightly uphill fairway on this short par 4 drops off to a green that is wide but not deep. Pine trees protect both sides of the fairway while bunkers guard the front of the elevated green. Don’t miss the green long!

**Hole 8 “Bunker Hill”            441 Yards, par 4**

Opening with an uphill tee shot, this par 4 plays longer than the yardage. Favor the right side of the fairway but avoid the large bunker and tree. The approach is downhill to a left-to-right sloping green protected by bunkers and a lake. Par is a great score.

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**Hole 9 “Wetlands” 380 Yards, par 4**

Accuracy is more important than length off the tee, so consider something other than driver. A tee shot that finds the fairway leaves a short iron into a green that slopes from back to front. Miss short to stay out of the hazard behind the green.

**Hole 10 “Elbow” 415 Yards, par 5**

This dogleg right requires a strong drive that favors the middle to left side of the fairway. The right side is blocked by pines. Favor the right side of the green.

**Hole 11 “Gator Bait” 216 Yards, par 3**

On this strong par 3 the play is long and left to get over the pond, which extends more to the right side. There also are greenside bunkers right and a bailout area short left.

**Hole 12 “Alligator Alley” 493 Yards, par 5**

This risk/reward hole offers two options: Lay back short of the pine on the left side and play it as a three-shot hole, or hit driver and aim for the narrowest part of the fairway. On the approach, position is key: The green is protected by a tree right and a bunker in front.

**Hole 13 “Long Way Out” 584 Yards, par 5**

This is the chance to bomb it off the tee to a wide fairway with only a large waste area on the left. Long hitters can try going for the green in two but the approach is blind and trees surround the elevated green, which features subtle breaks.

**Hole 14 “Due Left” 497 Yards, par 4**

This dogleg is shaped like the letter L, turning hard left. Long drivers may want to try hitting over the big tree at the elbow, but a miss will find the woods. The green slopes left to right and plays downhill so take less club.

**Hole 15 “The Big Tree” 236 Yards, par 3**

The big tree overhanging the right side of the green can send even good-looking shots into bad locations. Aim left and a little long to avoid the greenside bunker.

**Hole 16 “The Chute” 420 Yards, par 4**

A good chance for birdie begins by avoiding the bunkers on the left. On the approach, stay short of the back bunker.

**Hole 17 “Welcome” 416 Yards, par 4**

The fairway is one of the widest on the course, but well protected by bunkers on the right and trees to the left. There’s also a pond on the left side that extends to the front of the green. Do not be short on the approach to a two-tiered green that’s lower on the left side.

**Hole 18 “Home” 561 Yards, par 5**

This big finishing hole is almost impossible to hit in two, but can still yield a good score. Keep the tee shot short of the hazard that bisects the fairway. Hit the second shot to leave a short iron or wedge into a big, two-level green that slopes from right to left and back to front. The smart approach is left of the hole and short.
